From The Director

On Wednesday, May 2, I attended the Space Planning for the 21st Century Library workshop at the Dunham Public Library in Whitesboro. Hosted by the Central New York Library Resources Council and Mid York Library System, this all-day workshop was led by Alex Cohen, President of the Aaron Cohen Associates library consulting firm. Alex has worked with the Waterloo Library in our system.

Most of the attendees were from small and rural libraries who have either done minor expansions for youth areas or programming rooms, and almost everyone attending expressed the desire to do more with their current library spaces. Some libraries were exploring adding makerspace areas, while others were looking for ideas for flexible shelving and group study/work areas.

During the morning session, we learned a process called appreciative inquiry. This is when you look at your library space and determine four factors. Discover is when you look at your library and ask yourself what is the best part of the existing library? Dream is referring to what might be, or envisioning the future of your library. Design is when you actually determine what your library should be, including your space and your services. Deliver is the last stage of the process and makes your vision a reality.

Over the past few decades, collection space is shrinking in libraries, but user seating is growing. More and more patrons are using our libraries for meeting spaces, group study spaces, or just a quiet place to read or work. We also discussed service areas, such as circulation desk and reference desks, and space for staff not only for working, but also for offices and break rooms.

In the afternoon, Alex taught us how to do a visual scan of a library. Since we were at the Dunham Library, we scanned that library for over an hour. During a visual scan, participants are led around a library and "grade" each area they are brought to. For example, the group went outside to the parking lot to look at an area at the side of the library with a neglected picnic table, cones, and signs instructing people that they can't enter at that side of the library and must walk around to the front of the building. Since this is the main area that people park in to enter the library, is it friendly? Right away you are confronted with a negative feeling. Our group graded this area a "D" and offered suggestions for improvement to the library director. Another example is the foyer area of the library. We learned that the first ten feet of entering a space is considered a dead zone, where library patrons don't typically pay attention. Patrons are more focused on entering the building, returning materials, etc. The Dunham Library had seating, busy bulletin boards, and more negative signs telling patrons things they cannot do instead of welcoming them to the library. The group was able to offer quick aesthetic feedback to the director who made some immediate changes to the foyer area of her building.

As more of our libraries think of expanding or changing their spaces, this workshop was a useful opportunity to hear what other libraries were planning for their libraries.

No. 1 Criminal Phishing Botnet Turns Even More Tricky

The notorious Necurs botnet is one of the oldest and largest spam and phishing delivery systems in existence. It controls millions of machines that the criminal botmasters use to send malicious payloads. Necurs has now adopted a retro trick to make itself more evasive and less likely to have its phishing intercepted by your filters.

It's begun emailing archive files that unzip to a file with a .URL extension. This commonplace Windows shortcut opens a page directly in a browser. The advantage of this approach is that it's typically overlooked by email filters which are hunting for more complicated infection chains. The final destination of this link is a remote script file that downloads and automatically executes a malicious payload.

This common Windows shortcut is the social engineering tactic which tricks your users into thinking the email file attachment they just unzipped has created a folder that they need to enter and view the actual file.

Unfortunately, this is what crooks want because trying to access this faux folder will launch the infection chain. This time, they are exploiting the power of simplicity.

Your email filters usually apply preset rules, and this particular vector is probably not among them, so update your filter settings. Interestingly, Necurs does not infect computers using Russian as a language.

I suggest you send this email to your employees, friends and family. You're welcome to copy/paste/edit: There is a new email scam you need to watch out for. Bad guys are sending emails that have an archive file as an attachment. They often look like a voice mail message you have missed. Assume these attachments files are guilty until proven innocent!

Do not click on the zip file to listen to the message. Delete the file or click on the Phish Alert Button which forwards it to IT and deletes it from your inbox.

New Exploit: PDF Files Can Be Abused to Steal Windows Credentials

PDF files can be weaponized by malicious actors to steal Windows credentials (NTLM hashes) without any user interaction and only by opening a file, according to Assaf Baharav, a security researcher with cyber-security company CheckPoint.

This means a curious end user who opens a PDF attachment they did not ask for can be pnwed in about 15 seconds. Good thing this nasty is not in the wild *just yet...*

Baharav published research this week showing how a malicious actor could take advantage of features natively found in the PDF standard to steal NTLM hashes, the format in which Windows stores user credentials.



Paying a Fine from Check Out

• If the patron wants to pay the fine at checkout, click on the patron **Account** button while you are in the check out screen. You will notice that these options are greyed out until a patron is selected.




The Patron Status screen will display, opened to the patron Account.



 To pay a specific fine, click on the fine and then the PAY icon. To pay all fines, click on the PAY ALL icon. You may also choose to waive fines, depending on your library's policies.



Select the method of payment, add a note if needed, and click OK.
