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Staff Out of the Office

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From the Director:

This month, public library system directors throughout the State began working on a draft of library director/library manager qualifications along with the State Library. The State Library, in partnership with the public library systems, is responsible for assisting public and association libraries in New York State in complying with Education Law, Commissioner's Regulations and State Education Department program guidelines and requirements. From time to time, a library board may face unusual challenges (for example Civil Service issues or lack of qualified applicants), and may need additional time and/or assistance in order to achieve compliance with the State. In very rare instances, a library board may need to request a variance with the State. Luckily, there are only four current libraries in New York that have these variances, and none are located in our system.

The public library system directors are looking at issues such as what happens when the population of a library's chartered service area increases due to circumstances beyond the library board's control, and also what happens to current library managers/directors when a library board voluntarily expands the library's service area, bumping the library up into a new population category. Public library system directors received draft documents from the State last week to review, and we will be discussing this as a group next month during our regularly scheduled State conference call. Please remember that if you or your Board have any questions on library manager/library director qualifications, please reach out to me by email or phone so I can explain your library's qualification standards.



In this text, Chowdhury (professor of journalism, Information and Media Studies Group, University of Technology, Sydney) covers topics such as database technology, abstracting, indexing, users and user interfaces, multimedia and Internet searching, and trends. Besides revisions, a new chapter covers citation analysis. Chapters start with an introduction, quickly move to reviewing key elements, and conclude with a summation


and list of references. The book is intended for an international readership comprising "students of library and information science programmes, both at undergraduate and postgraduate levels." The chapters "Automatic Indexing and Organization," "Searching and Retrieval," and "Natural Language Processing and Information Retrieval" are dense and will challenge most undergrads. Screenshots tend to be small and unreadable. For LIS programs. --Stephen Fadel

Feminism: Reinventing the F-Word by Nadia Abushanab Higgins

From School Library Journal

Gr 6 Up –Young people interested in learning more about the history of women's rights in America will gain much from this well-written review of feminism. Higgins discusses the negative connotation attached to the concept, following up with a detailed explanation of the goals and theories behind modern-day feminism. She then takes readers on a historical journey through the three waves of feminism and covers suffrage, abortion rights, forced sterilization, and the demand for equal rights. Higgins also touches on how the newest incarnation of feminism seeks to expose how race,

class, ability, age, and sexual orientation affect the female experience. Wage gap issues, violence against women, and unrealistic beauty standards are all reviewed in separate chapters, supported by photographs and statistics that amplify the impact of the heavy topics. Higgins concludes by considering how young feminists might move forward in the digital age. Ample back matter encourages readers to seek out information and take action. This informative, impeccably researched investigation of the history of feminism will do more than fill a collection gap—it firmly emphasizes that *feminism* and *feminist* are not dirty words. In 2016, the program will support projects that identify and respond to challenges faced by individuals aging in place in rural areas. New initiatives to serve these individuals, as well as the expansion of current programs, will be considered. Grants will range up to \$25,000. Several smaller requests may be granted rather than one or two larger ones. Priority is given to projects that have significant potential for change and replication. The Library of Congress today launched its annual summer essay contest, in conjunction with public libraries in the Mid-Atlantic region, to encourage rising 5th- and 6th-grade students to reflect on books that have made a personal impact on their lives. The "A Book That Shaped Me" Summer Writing Contest is administered as part of summer reading programs at participating public libraries in Washington, D.C.; Maryland; Virginia; Delaware; Pennsylvania and West Virginia. Prizes will be awarded and top winners will be invited to present their essays during a special presentation at the <u>16th Library of Congress</u> <u>National Book Festival</u>, Saturday, Sept. 24 at the Walter E. Washington Convention Center in Washington, D.C. Students entering 5th and 6th grades in the fall of 2016 are eligible. Essays, focused on a single book, should be one page in length and must be submitted with an entry form, in person, at participating public library locations. The deadline for entries is **Friday, July 18, 2016**.

Duplicating Hold Requests:

This can be convenient for patrons that place multiple holds on one title for a book club or for patrons who place holds on multiple titles.

1. Using the Find Tool (F12) or Cataloging \rightarrow Bibliographic Records, locate the title you would like to place on hold.

2. Right click on the title and select **Place Hold...**

5. Choosing **Patron** will retain the title information and allow you to place the title on hold for another patron or for the same patron (usually for book club purposes). If placing duplicate hold requests on the same title for a patron, simply scan the patron's card or copy and paste their barcode each time. A window will display each time after saving notifying you that you are creating a duplicate hold on the same title, select **Yes**.



The Number 13
