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From the Director:



Next week, libraries will be receiving flyers about an upcoming system meeting we have planned for Thursday, September 22nd (9:30 – 11:30 at FLLS). Many of you have seen news articles, webinars and other information about the upcoming changes to the Fair Labor Standards Act that are effective December 1, 2016. There have been questions about how these changes will impact our member libraries, so we have scheduled this system meeting to answer many of your questions.

Topics that will be discussed will range from what it means to be exempt, the new salary requirements for exempt employees, the use of volunteers versus paid employees, the requirements of providing lunches and breaks, the importance of record keeping, and many more human services aspects of these FLSA changes. Our presenters, Kim Swartwout and Shari Constantino, have lectured extensively for the Human Services Coalition and are both Human Resources/Compensation Specialists at Cornell University. We hope this workshop will be helpful not only to library directors and managers, but also to Board members. Both Kim and Shari have also offered to do regional training sessions on a county level if there is a demand, so please let me know if you are interested and I can start working on setting those up.

YA Book of the Week:



Women of Colonial America by Brandon Miller

In colonial America, hard work proved a constant for most women—some ensured their family's survival through their skills, while others sold their labor or lived in bondage as indentured servants or slaves. Yet even in a world defined entirely by men, a world where few thought it important to record a female's thoughts, women found ways to step forth. Elizabeth Ashbridge survived an abusive indenture to become a Quaker preacher. Anne Bradstreet penned her poems while raising eight children in the wilderness. Anne Hutchinson went toe-to-toe with Puritan authorities. Margaret Hardenbroeck Philipse built a trade empire in New Amsterdam. And Eve, a Virginia slave, twice ran away to freedom.

Using a host of primary sources, author Brandon Marie Miller recounts the roles, hardships, and daily lives of Native American, European, and African women in the 17th and 18th centuries. With strength, courage, resilience, and resourcefulness, these women and many others played a vital role in the mosaic of life in the North American colonies.

Polaris Tip of the Week



Sending Search Results to a New Record Set: You can create a record set prior to conducting a search and the results from that search will automatically populate the record set.

1. Bring up the Item Find Tool, Cataloging -> Item Records or (Ctrl+Alt+F9).

2. Click on the Settings tab. Check the box next to "Send Results to a New Record Set." Enter a name for your record set, remember to use FLLS naming conventions or your record set may be deleted. Use your library code and a description of the record set.

Click on the General tab and enter your search term(s). It is helpful to also click on the Branches tab and select just your library. When your search selections are made, click the **Search** button.
 A box will display informing you that a record set has been created and the number of records in that record set. Notice a time stamp has been added to the end of the name. You can elect to open the record set immediately and start working on it or select **No** and search for it later.



To search for this record set:

- 1. Go to Cataloging -> Record Sets.
- 2. Type in the name of the Record Set and click on Search.
- 3. In the results, double click on the record set to open it.
