From the Director



On Friday, June 30th, FLLS hosted our annual Correctional Facilities meeting. Finger Lakes provides library services to our five county jails and to four correctional facilities in our service area: Auburn Correctional Facility, Cayuga Correctional Facility, Five Points Correctional Facility and Willard Drug Treatment Center. FLLS is one of seventeen public library systems in New York State that receives State funding to provide library services to New York State correctional facilities. Examples of library services we provide include collection development and collection ordering, delivery, ILL, reference services, space planning, programming help such as creating a book discussion group or an adult summer reading program, and continuing education opportunities.

Finger Lakes is obligated to have at least one yearly meeting of our correctional facilities librarians to discuss a yearly Plan of Service

according to the State Library. During this meeting we review and set a yearly budget which includes ILL, delivery, and consultant costs, as well as materials and program purchasing. It is also a great opportunity for our correctional facility librarians to network with each other and to share programming tips or ideas, or to discuss issues they are having within their facility. For instance, today we learned that Five Points is starting a book discussion group for inmates this summer, with the hopes of having it start in August. Cayuga Correctional Facility is part of a pilot program that loans out tablets to their inmates for 3 hours a morning. Tablets are preloaded with over 800 books, games, music, and educational lessons including math and essays. The library reports that music is the most used on the tablets and that older inmates who were incarcerated before recent technology advancements struggled to learn how to use a tablet at first. For correctional facilities who have Special Housing Units, the new demands of having two books and one periodical switched out weekly to inmates is demanding and staff intensive.

This year we had a guest speaker, Julianna Truesdale, at our correctional facility meeting. Julianna is the owner of True Creative, a design and marketing firm in Ithaca. Before becoming a business owner, she was a methamphetamine addict for sixteen years and was homeless until 2005. With a felony conviction on her record, she found applying for jobs and

colleges challenging and spoke to group about the challenges of having a felony on your application. Her comeback story was truly inspirational and hearing her re-entry experience was educational for our correctional facilities.

I hope everyone has a safe and happy Fourth of July!

Scam of the Week

[ALERT] Looks Like A New Worldwide Ransomware Outbreak

Motherboard reported: "A quickly-spreading, world-wide ransomware outbreak has reportedly hit targets in Spain, France, Ukraine, Russia, and other countries.

On Tuesday, a wide range of private businesses reportedly suffered ransomware attacks. Although it is not clear if every case is connected, at least several of them appear to be related to the same strain of malware." Motherboard continued: "The attacks are similar to the recent WannaCry outbreak, and motherboard has seen several reports of infections shared by victims on Twitter. We were not able to immediately confirm the veracity of the reports, but several security researchers and firms also reported the attacks.

"We are seeing several thousands of infection attempts at the moment, comparable in size to Wannacry's first hours," Costin Raiu, a security researcher at Kaspersky Lab, told Motherboard in an online chat. Judging by photos posted to Twitter and images provided by sources, many of the alleged attacks

involved a piece of ransomware that displays red text on a black background, and demands \$300 worth of bitcoin.

"If you see this text, then your files are no longer accessible, because they are encrypted," the text reads, according to one of the photos. "Perhaps you are busy looking for a way to recover your files, but don't waste your time. Nobody can recover your files without our decryption service."

Raiu believes the ransomware strain is known as Petya or Petrwrap, a highly sophisticated Russian strain, withaout all the errors that WannaCry contained, and no kill-switch. According to a tweet from anti-virus company Avira, the Petya attacks were taking advantage of the EternalBlue exploit previously leaked by the group known as The Shadow

Brokers (Motherboard could not independently confirm this at the time of writing).



If You Have Not Done So Yet, Apply This Patch Immediately.

From what we have been able to learn, this new worm spreads through SMB just like WannaCry so when we're talking about machines behind firewalls being impacted, it implies port 445 being open and at-risk hosts listening to inbound connections. It'd only take one machine behind the firewall to become infected to then put all other workstations and servers at risk due to it being a true worm.

In the meantime, harden yourselves against this Windows Network Share vulnerability and ensure that all systems are fully patched with the "MS17-010" security update (link below) and **remind all staff to Think Before They Click** when they receive any out of the ordinary emails. https://technet.microsoft.com/en-us/library/security/ms17-010.aspx


Suspending Holds via the PAC:

1. Log into your PAC account and go to **My Account à Hold Requests**.



- 2. Place a checkmark to the left of the item you want to suspend. If there is no checkmark box available, the item cannot be suspended.
- 3. Click on Suspend/Reactivate Selected.

4. Type in the date you wish to reactivate the hold request, and click **Submit**. In both PAC and in the staff client, once the hold request is reactivated, the patron appears back in the queue where they were before the hold request was suspended.
