





# **From The Director**



Our newest staff member, Nora Burrows, will be joining us on Monday, July 23. Nora is our Member Services Librarian, and will be working on a variety of projects at FLLS. First and foremost, as Member Services Librarian, she will be traveling to our member libraries and offering guidance and assistance with policies, continuing education, library promotion and marketing ideas, collection development and weeding help, and programming ideas. She will be overseeing the youth and teen services to our member libraries, including summer

reading, collection development, the State Family Literacy Grant, and the Community Foundation of Tompkins County library grants. She will also in charge of our databases, econtent subscriptions, and will work on our social media accounts.

Most recently, Nora was the Youth Services Librarian at the Catskill Public Library in the Mid Hudson Library System. While there she provided reference and readers' advisory services. collection development for youth collections, youth services programming, and summer reading planning and implementation. Nora also has worked at the Crandall Public Library in the Southern Adirondack Library System and the Washington Avenue branch of the Albany Public Library in the Upper Hudson Library System. While in library school, Nora worked at the New York State Library with Youth Services Consultants for all of the public library systems. She has extensive knowledge and work experience in several statewide youth services programs including the Family Literacy Grant, Summer Reading at New York Libraries, and the early initiative Ready to Read at New York Libraries. While at the State Library, she managed various social media accounts for the State Library, and developed grants and continuing education opportunities for youth services consultants.



Nora grew up in a small town in New Hampshire making the ten minute drive to the local library with her parents at least once a week, or more if she could. When she was looking at colleges, she stopped in at the public libraries and ended up at a college whose local library had a strong sense of community and where she ended up doing a robotics demonstration for children while in college. Nora has a strong admiration for small and rural libraries, and believes that the staff of small libraries use their creativity and ingenuity in serving their communities despite their sometimes limited resources. She looks forward to working with directors, library staff, trustees, and system consultants to make libraries be the best they can possibly be.



# Russian Indictment: They Used Criminal Tradecraft Like Spear Phishing to Hack the Democratic Party

The email arrived in Hillary Clinton's campaign chairman John Podesta's inbox around March 19, 2016, during the height of the presidential primaries, spoofed to look like a standard security request from Google to change his password.

The email was actually from Aleksey Lukashev, a senior lieutenant in Russian military intelligence, using the account "john356gh" to mask his purpose, the official indictment shows. The email contained an embedded link that secretly opened Podesta's account to the Main Intelligence Directorate of the General Staff, known as the GRU hacking team at 20 Komsomolskiy Prospekt, near Moscow's Red Square.

Two days later, the Russian operatives stole — and later leaked — more than 50,000 of Podesta's private emails throwing Clinton's bid for the White House into turmoil.

On Friday, the Justice Department indicted Lukashev and 11 other officers in the GRU for interfering in the 2016 presidential election by hacking and leaking tens of thousands of emails and other material from Clinton's campaign, the Democratic National Committee, the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee and others.

Kevin Mitnick and I took some time to read the indictment. The GRU guys have been using tradecraft that's the same as what internet criminals use every day and what white hat pen testers use to test their client's controls. 


# **Polaris FAQ**

#### Creating an Excel Spreadsheet from a Record Set

- Go to the Utilities tab and select Reports and Notices.
- 2. In the upper right hand corner, click the Printer icon and select how you want your spreadsheet to be displayed.



Follow the following folders to get to AA-Item List from Record Set:
 Custom → Cataloging → Item → AA-Item List from Record Set.



4. Have your Record Set number ready to enter, and click **Submit**. Make sure it is an item record or your spreadsheet will be blank. Excel/Word/etc. will now appear with your spreadsheet. Use this spreadsheet however you choose.
