## **From The Director**



On Friday, October 12th, roughly 100 library trustees, directors, and staff joined us to celebrate our 60th Annual Meeting. Our Annual Meeting is always a special time of year when we celebrate with our member libraries, but this year was especially exciting as it was our 60th anniversary of receiving our charter. While many things have changed over the past 60 years, our commitment to providing our member libraries with the resources to help

them be better libraries remains strong.

Our goal is to have an Annual Meeting that fulfills our role in having an annual business meeting for our membership, but also to provide a speaker that highlights a particular need for our public libraries. Over the past year, we have heard from many of our libraries that they are looking to put more of their library budgets on a referendum vote. We have found that both directors and trustees usually need more information on whether that is feasible for their communities. Because of this, the staff at FLLS and our board decided to hold a different format this year for our annual meeting, and had a two-hour workshop instead focusing on this topic.

Brian Hildreth, Executive Director of the Southern Tier Library System and Margo Gustina, Deputy Director of the Southern Tier Library System led an interactive workshop on funding referendums for small and midsized libraries. We started the morning with an exercise between library directors and fictitious town supervisors where library directors were tasked with trying to receive more money for summer reading programs and town supervisors had a need to fund a new ambulance. While this was clearly role playing, this is often how library directors need to think when asking for village, town or county money.

We also learned from Brian and Margo the difference in referendum votes, heard about their successes on obtaining large referendum increases for their libraries in the Southern Tier Library System, and gave our libraries a helpful timeline on how to lead a grassroots initiative for stable public funding in the future. Please remember if your board is looking to increase their referendum funding, both Nora and I would be happy to come out and meet with your board and library to discuss your funding options.

The Board of Trustees at FLLS is looking for library trustees to take part in a committee to evaluate and give advice on our annual meeting structure. If you are interested, please contact Kristi Downham at FLLS for more information.



#### Add Wi-Fi Proximity to Your Cyber Attack Concern List

The latest attack from the Russian GRU involves both traditional spear phishing and Close Access attacks in an attempt to thwart an investigation of their nerve agent attack in the UK.

The nerve agent attack purportedly involved Russia's military intelligence agency GRU wanting to dispose of a UK-based Russian spy and his daughter. The organization responsible for investigating the attack – the Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons (OPCW) – came under two attacks.

Officials say that four Russian GRU officers tried a Close Access attack – where they attempted to hack into the OPCW network through its Wi-Fi network by parking a car close to the organization's headquarters looking for unsecured devices on the network that could be compromised to gain access.

This attack technique allows attackers to obfuscate who they are by originating the attack on the organization's own network. When that failed, the GRU reportedly followed up with a spear phishing attack impersonating Swiss federal authorities to target OPCW employees directly in order to access OPCW computer systems.

It's easy to dismiss stories like this, as the criminals in this case were government-sponsored attackers. You don't think of your organization as a target for these kinds of attacks. But, it's important to keep in mind that cybercriminals use these very same tactics.

The Close Access attack is less likely, as cybercriminals tend to want to remain in hiding, attacking from afar – but the intent to access your network to gain control over systems, applications, and data is relatively consistent across attacks.

Stopping "close access" attacks requires shoring up your Wi-Fi security, which includes requiring authentication. Protecting against spear phishing attacks involves a layered security approach that includes email scanning, endpoint-based protection, and new-school security awareness training to educate your users on common social engineering tactics and scam methods used.





## **Polaris FAQ**

Ad hoc Bulk Change: Perform a bulk change without requiring a record set.

- 1. Open the Find Tool. Customize your search so that you pull up the desired records. Click on the Branches tab and click on the **Unselect All** button. Then, click on the checkbox next to your library so you only bring in items from your collection.
- Click on the Search button. Once the search is complete look in the lower right corner of the Item Find Tool. You will see the number of records retrieved. Press the Ctrl+Shift+A buttons on your keyboard to retrieve all the records into the Item Find Tool.
- 3. At this point you can perform an "Ad hoc Bulk Change" on your items. Select all the items by pressing the **Ctrl+A** on your keyboard which will highlight all the items in the results section. Right click on one of the highlighted items and then left click on the "Ad hoc Bulk Change" from the pop up menu.



4. The Item Record Bulk Change window that comes up should look familiar. Make your selections for the desired change and click **OK**. Follow the prompts to complete the Bulk Change.

Deadline: December 14, 2018

The American Library Association (ALA) and Dollar General Literacy Foundation invite public libraries to apply for grants to expand services for English language learners or adults in need of basic education and workforce development. Up to 16 grants of \$10,000 each will be awarded. Read the project guidelines and apply online by Dec. 14, 2018. Public libraries are eligible if they serve adult English language learners and are located within 20 miles of a Dollar General Store, distribution center or corporate office.
