This is a reminder that if you are considering submitting a bullet aid letter, the deadline is quickly approaching. Please remember, for the past few years, libraries have been included in the list of entities that are eligible to receive Bullet Aid funding. NYLA encourages member libraries to request funding from their elected officials. The funds available are under the discretion of the **Senate Republicans only**. Awards via Bullet Aid are typically voted on during the last day of the legislative session (scheduled for **June 16**), so your letters should go out as soon as possible. I have proofed a few of your requests and they have been excellent! Please don't hesitate to email me if you have any questions or need help with this – we want our libraries to receive as much money as possible.

Finger Lakes is happy to announce that we will soon be providing Hoopla to all of our member libraries and our patrons. Similar to OverDrive, this streaming service will allow our patrons to instantly borrow free digital movies, music, eBooks, and eGraphic Novels, with their library card. This simple to access and use service is available to any patron with a library card, a web browser, smart phone or tablet. Public Librarian Certificate Reminder

All librarians who received a public librarian certificate after December 31, 2009 must complete 60 hours of professional development every five years, and they must renew their certificate in order for their certificate to stay active. Certificate status (active/inactive) may be checked at http://www.nysl.nysed.gov/libdev/cert/search.htm.

Certificate holders must have an active certificate in order to be employed in a public librarian position. There are still many certificate holders who received certificates in 2010 and early 2011 who have not renewed their certificates or created accounts in the online portal. 

Free Lunch at the Library

Friday, April 15, 1:45pm – 2:45pm

Presentation from librarians participating in the Free Summer Lunch Program in Newark and Palmyra. This is part of the Hunger Solutions of New York Free program that any library can participate in. They are always looking for new sites. Steps to get involved:

- 1. Call Hunger Solutions New York to see if your library qualifies: (518) 436-8757. Ask if your community qualifies which is based on poverty levels. Be clear about your physical location. Ask for the contact information of nearby sites already offering free lunch.
- 2. Get in touch with the different sites to find out who their site sponsors are.

- 3. Get in touch with the site sponsors and ask if they would be willing to add the library as a site.
- 4. Once the sponsor is willing to add the library as a site, set up a meeting to talk specifics:
 - a. Will we serve breakfast, lunch, snack or supper?
 - b. When and where will we serve the lunches?
 - c. Who makes, delivers and serves the food?
 - d. Who will set up, clean up and record statistics?
- Confirm the details.

Tips:

- Call Hunger Solutions first
- Be Resilient: You might have to call a few times
- Schedule: Try to have a library program take place around the meal. Double statistics!
- Plan and promote early.
- Make it clear this is just for kids. Adults cannot have free lunches!





YA Book of the Week:



Radioactive!: How Irène Curie and Lise Meitner Revolutionized Science and Changed the World by Winifred Conkling

In 1934, Irène Curie, working with her husband and fellow scientist, Frederic Joliot, made a discovery that would change the world: artificial radioactivity. This breakthrough allowed scientists to modify elements and create new ones by altering the structure of atoms. Curie shared a Nobel Prize with her husband for their work. But when she was nominated to the French Academy of Sciences, the academy denied her admission and voted to disqualify all women from membership. Four years later, Curie's breakthrough led physicist Lise Meitner to a brilliant leap of

understanding that unlocked the secret of nuclear fission. Meitner's unique insight was critical to the revolution in science that led to nuclear energy and the race to build the atom bomb, yet her achievement was left unrecognized by the Nobel committee in favor of that of her male colleague. *Radioactive!* presents the story of two women breaking ground in a male-dominated field, scientists still largely unknown despite their crucial contributions to cutting-edge research, in a nonfiction narrative that reads with the suspense of a thriller. Photographs and sidebars illuminate and clarify the science in the book.

In 2016, the program will support projects that identify and respond to challenges faced by individuals aging in place in rural areas. New initiatives to serve these individuals, as well as the expansion of current programs, will be considered. Grants will range up to \$25,000. Several smaller requests may be granted rather than one or two larger ones. Priority is given to projects that have significant potential for change and replication. Library of Congress and Mid-Atlantic Public Libraries Kick Off Summer Essay Contest Rising 5th and 6th Graders Asked to Write About "A Book That Shaped Me"

The Library of Congress today launched its annual summer essay contest, in conjunction with public libraries in the Mid-Atlantic region, to encourage rising 5th- and 6th-grade students to reflect on books that have made a personal impact on their lives. The "A Book That Shaped Me" Summer Writing Contest is administered as part of summer reading programs at participating public libraries in Washington, D.C.; Maryland; Virginia; Delaware; Pennsylvania and West Virginia. Prizes will be awarded and top winners will be invited to present their essays during a special presentation at the 16th Library of Congress National Book Festival, Saturday, Sept. 24 at the Walter E. Washington Convention Center in Washington, D.C. Students entering 5th and 6th grades in the fall of 2016 are eligible. Essays, focused on a single book, should be one page in length and must be submitted with an entry form, in person, at participating public library locations. The deadline for entries is Friday, July 18, 2016.

Polaris Tip of the Week

Placing Multiple Holds:



You can place multiple holds for the same patron by holding down the control key and selecting more than one record at a time. This would be useful for when a patron discovers a new author and wants to reserve several books by that author. This technique is also very useful when a patron wants to place holds on several item records on the same subject.

1. Using **Patron Status (F6)** or **Patron Records (F7)** locate the correct patron, open their status or record, and click on the **Place Hold** icon.




2. Click on the **Find** button located next to the Title field in the Bibliographic section of the Hold Request workform.



- 3. Using the Find Tool, search by author (or subject). Press and hold down on the control (ctrl) key on the keyboard, while clicking on several records from the results screen. This highlights specific records you want to place on hold.
- 4. When your chosen records are highlighted, let go of the control key and press the enter key on the keyboard.

- 5. All selected records are now added to the Hold Request workform.
- 6. Finally, you click the **Save** button and the holds will appear on the patron's account.

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



