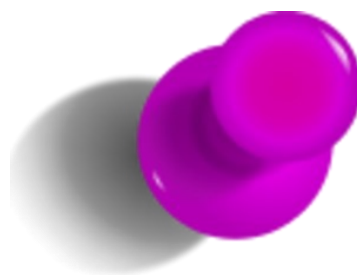

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From the Director:



This morning, I attended the Tim Green Author Event at the Cortland County Office Building Gymnasium. The gym was packed with 159 kids and 76 adults to see Mr. Green speak. As you may remember, FLLS raffled off this author visit in conjunction with our summer reading program and the Cortland Free Library was selected as the winner. Cortland Free Library did a fabulous job partnering with a wide variety of community partners for today's event, including the Cortland Junior-Senior High School, the Cortland Youth Bureau, Phillips Free Library, Randall Elementary School, various football groups, and Max Graphics. Funding for the event

was made possible through the support of the Friends of the Tompkins County Public Library. A special thanks to Cortland Free Library Youth Services Librarian Tammy Sickmon for doing such a great job hosting today.

Tim Green may be an ex-football player and writer of both adult books and children's books, but his message this morning was all about what reading can bring to a child's life. While he famously says that reading is weightlifting for your brain, he also talked about how reading is the exercise of being in someone else's shoes. He urged kids to read to learn the love of reading and also because reading transports you into the characters of the story you are reading and kids can become less afraid. Tim Green also stressed the importance of reading to children and urged kids to read a book for five chapters, and if they don't like it, to move on to a different book. His message was to read for fun (in addition to reading for your school work) and to not waste your time on a book you don't like. He also stressed the importance of kindness, working hard, and seeking out people who may be different than you. His message was inspiring not only to kids, but also to parents and the librarians in the room who know the value of reading and discussing books.

Construction Grant Portal Now Open

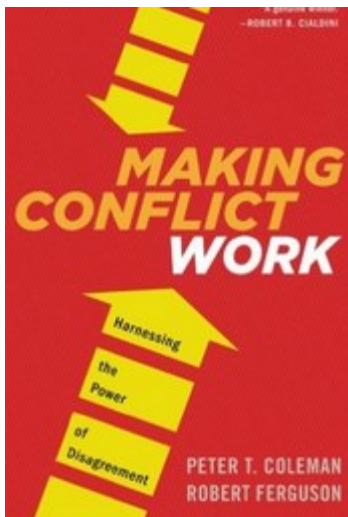

YA Book of the Week:

Historium: Welcome to the Museum by Jo Nelson

Gr 4–8—This museum-style exhibition of world culture goes beyond simply covering the Greek, Roman, and Egyptian worlds by encompassing southern African, Polynesian, and Hopewell cultures. The work begins with a general introduction to archaeology and provides a full-spread time line for reference. An index cites the museum locations of the depicted artifacts. The strength of this work is the gorgeous exhibits, presented in full color on oversize pages. Each exhibit begins with a brief overview of a specific culture. The presentation is less cluttered than that of DK's popular "Eyewitness" series, as most pages contain no more than six items. Readers will discover household articles, such as Pueblo jars, as well as large-scale features, including Roman mosaics. Thorough captions provide context. Wilkinson's illustrations of the various artifacts are photorealistic, with exacting detail. Only a few statuary pieces come off as obvious illustrations. The objects stand out on the pages, the backgrounds set in bold, solid colors. The chapters, called "Galleries," are arranged by continent, and the various exhibitions are further broken down

into culture groups. In certain galleries, which focus on precise historical periods, the cultural groups are presented chronologically; in the case of America, the section on the Olmec is followed by the Maya and then the Aztecs. This book accomplishes a difficult goal: providing a high-interest visual experience that also has informational depth. VERDICT A beautiful addition to any elementary or middle school library, this work is the closest readers will come to attending a museum without leaving home.


Associations

You can create associations between two or more patron records so that when one record is open all records associated with it are accessible. For example, you might associate all members of a family so that parents can check out their own items, and then quickly renew items or pay fines for their children. You can also associate spouses.

Search for the patron's record in **Circulation à Patron Status (F6)**.

Select **View à Associations** or click  to display the Associations view.

Click the plus sign    to display the **Add Associations** dialog box.



Enter the barcode of the patron with whom you want to create an association, using one of these methods:

Scan the barcode from the patron's library card, or type the barcode in the **Associated Patron(s)** box, and press **(Enter)**.

If you do not have the patron's library card, click **Find** to display the Polaris Find Tool and search for the patron's record. Right-click the record in the results list and choose **Select**.

The patron's barcode appears in the **Associated Patron(s)** box.

Check one or both boxes: "*Block me if these patron records are blocked*" and "*Allow me to pick up holds for these patrons*."

Click **OK** to submit your settings.

Joseph Shubert Library Excellence Award
