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From the Director:



I've been taking part in the Library Campaign Training Institute webinars hosted each week by Libby Post of Communication Services. This week was the third week and the topic was Message, Marketing and Media. I've been lucky to hear Libby speak a number of times and each time I walk away with new ideas and strategies that are helpful in promoting libraries in our communities. Libraries don't have to be planning a capital campaign to use some of her marketing ideas; instead they can be used by any library who wants to make sure that their

community knows the importance of their library.

One example we went over this week was that while communications can't always be controlled, your message about your library can be. You as the director or the manager of your library must have a simple and clear idea that is the foundation and guide for all of your communication. Think in terms of clear, concise, simple, and consistent messaging. If you have a prepared message about your library, you can always use it to answer any question that patrons, donors, or even opponents may have. We always mention having an "elevator speech" prepared in which you can communicate what your library does, what you stand for, and what value your library has in your community in a clear and quick way.

Over the past few weeks, FLLS has been conducting focus groups for our new Plan of Service, due this fall to the State. One of the things more and more of our libraries have been telling me is they still feel they need help with getting their message out to their community and they are thinking of campaigns to prepare for more sustainable funding options. Starting next year, FLLS will providing more in-depth system meetings and workshops on advocacy and sustainable funding options, and we always welcome new ideas for other system meeting topics.



The coward's guide to conflict: effective resolution for those who would rather run than fight by Tim Ursiny

Ursiny, a mediation coach and former practicing psychologist, readily admits that he's a "coward" when it comes to any kind of conflict. He believes that there are many people like himself who wince at the thought of having an argument or avoid confronting work colleagues. Everyone, regardless of their position at work, can learn to handle conflict more effectively. The benefits, according to Ursiny, are immense and include more self-confidence, less anger, greater self-respect and more intimacy. To help readers learn how to change the way they handle conflict, each chapter opens with a brief case

study. The author then uses checklists and exercises designed to teach the reader new ways to handle conflict. Ursiny is clever and readers will recognize and immediately understand his hypothetical situations. For example, the author says that people avoid exercise by focusing on the "pain" of getting up early, taking time, or not being able to sleep later or do other things they enjoy more. The motivated person, on the other hand, focuses on how much better he or she will look and feel and the positive reinforcement that other people will provide. Particularly useful is the chapter on "Avoiding the Top Ten Mistakes Made When Dealing With People." Readers will identify with the irate man whose flight has been canceled. This is a wonderfully engaging book that should easily motivate readers to rethink their behavior and conversations both at work and at home.







YA Book of the Week:

Sabotage: The Mission to Destroy Hitler's Atomic Bomb by Neal Bascomb

Gr 8 Up—The people of Norway had hoped to remain neutral during World War II as they had in the Great War, but that hope was shattered when Nazi Germany invaded Norway's ports in the early days of April 1940. In addition to taking over Norway's land and exiling their king, Germany also intended to capture the hydroelectric plant at Vemork in Norway's frozen highlands. The plant was one of the only places in the world that produced a substance called heavy water, an extremely important ingredient in Germany's race to develop an atomic bomb. It would take the Allies several unsuccessful attempts before a time bomb planted on the ferry transporting the heavy water and production equipment across a deep lake spelled the demise of Germany's atomic research. Bascomb is a master of taking complicated histories and turning them into exciting works of nonfiction. By exploring the various backgrounds of each of the Norwegian resistance fighters and scientists, he gives readers a chance to understand their motivations and properly empathize with their struggles. This investment pays off as the stakes get higher, and the narrative deftly switches between their perspectives, creating a dramatic and suspenseful tension like no other. A generous amount of captioned black-and-

white photos of the men, buildings, and artifacts help to guide readers through the text. VERDICT This excellent treatise on a little-known episode of World War II is a first choice.—Eldon Younce, Anthony Public Library, KS




Polaris Tip of the Week

Using Web Reporting to Download a Report as an Excel Spreadsheet


First, visit the web reporting website: http://catalog.flls.org/reports. It is recommended that you use the Internet Explorer browser.

Login with the info for a specific Polaris client and be sure to include the FLLS domain. Ex., at Phillips Free Library, they would use homcirc.org or flls\homcirc as the username.

Locate your specific report. Enter the desired parameters and click on View Report.



Finally, click on the floppy disk icon and choose **Excel**. The spreadsheet will download. You can click on it to open, edit it as needed, and save it to a new location.
