Zinio Name Change

On December 5, 2016, Recorded Books will be changing the name of Zinio for Libraries to RBdigital and launching a newly enhanced RBdigital mobile app. The following was sent in an email last week:

- The new RBdigital app will combine our Zinio for Libraries magazine app with our OneClickdigital eBook/audiobook app, so access to audiobooks, magazines, and eBooks will all be in one app.
- The new RBdigital app for patrons will feature a newly improved navigation and native search.
- Access to the Zinio for Libraries app will end on February 1, 2017, and access to magazines will
 only be available on the RBdigital app.
- Patrons will be notified directly through their current Zinio for Libraries app to download the new RBdigital app.



YA Book of the Week:



Witness: Passing the Torch of Holocaust Memory to New Generations by Eli Rubenstein

Gr 6 Up—With many extant works on the Holocaust, this book stands out for its firsthand accounts from survivors. As the subtitle indicates, this work attempts to connect Holocaust eyewitnesses with young people who are long-removed in time and place from the Shoah. Rubenstein's volume commemorates the 25-plus years of the March of the Living, a program that

brings secondary students to Poland to visit Holocaust-related sites. Students march from Auschwitz to Birkenau on Holocaust Remembrance Day to honor the memory of Holocaust victims. Rubenstein has compiled moving comments from survivors and victims, March participants, and notables (Pope Francis, President Obama). The text and captions are generally clear (with some exceptions) and include prose and poem responses from the young marchers. The many photographs (both archival and contemporary) are compelling: individual faces help make the ungraspable numbers personal. Some may find that the oblong format makes holding this heavy volume awkward. Important topics—responsibility, resistance, prejudice (including quotas for refugees), and the basic goodness, or not, of humans—are raised. VERDICT Recommended for most libraries.—Patricia D. Lothrop, St. George's School, Newport, RI

Hold Requests in the PowerPAC Catalog


Placing a Hold Request

99% of the time a patron will need to place a "Bib Level" hold request, which means that regardless of who owns the item, the first available copy will satisfy the hold request.

- 1. Conduct a **Search** and identify the item you wish to request. *Note: Items that have been classified as "new" and restricted to the owning library's patrons only will be satisfied before holds placed by other patrons.*
- 2. Click on the Place Hold Request link.



3. You will be asked to log in, if you aren't already.
You will now be able to review your request. At this time, you can change the pickup location and the activation date.



- 5. If satisfied, click on **Submit Request**. You may be notified that there are active requests for this item, signifying a longer wait time, click on **Continue**.
- 6. Your request has been placed. You will be notified when the item is available for pick-up. A final screen will ask you to verify that your contact information is correct. You can choose to update your contact information, return to your search results, go to your list of hold requests, or log out.

1800: Due to a technicality, the election of 1800 resulted in a tie between Thomas Jefferson and Aaron Burr, Jefferson's vice presidential running mate. After several months, the U.S. House of Representatives certified Jefferson as the winner, but the confusion prompted a clarification of voting procedures, which resulted in the Twelfth Amendment to the
