From the Director



On Monday, library directors will be receiving an email from me about proposed changes to the Minimum Standards of NY public libraries. The New York State Library has asked the 23 system directors to share a working document with library directors, and to have feedback about the proposed changes by the end of April. Public library system directors are then meeting in person in Albany on May 16th to discuss how our members feel about the changes. On Thursday, we had a Director's Advisory Council Meeting with all 13 member representatives present and spent a full

morning discussing the document. The feedback and suggestions from our directors who were present for that meeting was extremely helpful for me to start to get an understanding of concerns, especially from our smallest libraries. As you will be able to see from the document when you receive it on Monday, some of the proposed changes will have a financial impact on libraries.

I'd also like to send a final reminder to library directors that the deadline for the ARSL (<u>Association for Rural and Small Libraries</u>) Conference scholarship is next Friday, March 31. The Conference is being held in St. George, Utah and will be taking place on September 7-9. The main conference hotel was sold out in one day, but we reserved two rooms at the overflow hotel. Registration for the conference is in early April, and will sell out this year, so I need applications by March 31 so we can register the winner on opening registration day. I attended last year, as well as Priscilla from the Phillips Free Library in Homer, and we both found the conference to be extremely helpful and fun. Conference sessions are varied, and cover a range of topics including workshops on working with trustees, planning programs with little money, STEM activities, and space planning for small libraries. I was able to network with librarians

from around the country, and learned what libraries are doing in Kansas, Mississippi, North Dakota, Florida, Georgia, and more. I even had dinner with the State Librarian of North Dakota who took a small group of us on an impromptu trip to Minnesota to visit a Viking Museum. FLLS will pay for conference registration, hotel, and flight to Utah, as well as any meals not covered by the conference.

Scam of the Week



New FBI and IRS Alerts Against W-2 Phishing

There is a wave of W-2 phishing attacks going on. We see these coming in through thousands of reported scam attempts via our Phishing Alert Button. The FBI and the IRS have repeatedly posted warnings that these attacks have started early and that the volume has gone up significantly this year.

Remember those Nigerian prince emails? They are also called 'Nigerian 419' scams because the first wave of them came from Nigeria. The '**419**' part of the name comes from the section of Nigeria's Criminal Code which outlaws the practice. Well, those gangs have all "growed up" and they are now behind many of today's W-2 scams. It is surprisingly easy to do a little bit of research and send a spoofed email that looks like it is from the CEO.

These W-2 scams are hitting everywhere, even a Cybersecurity Contractor was hit with one of these. On Thursday, March 16, the CEO of Defense Point Security, LLC — a Virginia company that bills itself as "the choice provider of cyber security services to the federal government" — told all employees that their W-2 tax data was handed directly to fraudsters after someone inside the company fell for a W-2 spear phishing attack. OUCH!



What To Do About It

I strongly suggest you send this to all employees, and mark it as **important** for all staff in HR, Legal and Accounting. You're welcome to copy/paste/edit:

"This year, authorities are warning about a massive wave of W-2 tax form phishing scams. Cyber criminals are sending "spoofed" emails that look like they come from the CEO or another C-level executive and ask for a PDF with the W-2 tax information of all employees. The W-2's have all the information needed to file fraudulent tax returns and steal anyone's identity.

Here are five steps to prevent an incredible amount of hassle and possible damage:

- If you receive any email requesting any kind of W-2 tax information, pick up the phone and verify that request before you email anything to anybody.
- File your taxes at the state and federal level as quickly as you can, or file for an October 16 extension early, *before* the bad guys can file a bogus claim.
- Consider filing form 14039 and request an IP PIN from the government. Form 14039 requires you to state you believe you are likely to be a victim of identity fraud. Even if cyber criminals haven't tried to file a bogus tax return in your name, virtually every American's data has been stolen which can lead to your identity being stolen.
- Every 4 months, get a free once-a-year credit report from the three major credit bureaus. Get them on your calendar (cycle through them) and dispute any unauthorized activity.
- Place a "security freeze" or "credit freeze" on your files with all three credit bureaus to prevent ID thieves from assuming your identitity and open up a line of credit in your name.






Polaris Tip of the Week

Ezra Jack Keats Library Mini Grants

Deadline: March 31, 2017

The Ezra Jack Keats Foundation is offering mini-grants of \$500 to design and implement a creative program for libraries. These mini-grants are awarded to public schools, public libraries, and public preschool programs that provide free, creative, and innovative programs that support or extend the Learning Standards for children ages preschool-grade 12.

Support for Digitizing Cultural Resources

Deadline: April 3, 2017

Grants, ranging from a minimum of \$50,000 to a maximum of \$250,000 in the case of a single-institution project or \$500,000 for a collaborative project, will be provided to colleges and universities, research centers, museums, libraries, historical societies, cultural associations, etc.

Sparkplug Foundation

Deadline: : April 10 for letters of Intent

The Sparkplug Foundation primarily provides grants to start-up nonprofit organizations or new projects of established nonprofits that are addressing the fields of music, education, and community organizing. In the Music category, the Foundation supports emerging professional musicians or music-development programs. In Education and Teaching, the Foundation funds projects that deal with "the whole student" and with learning as a community activity.

Deadline: April 15, 2017

Ten winners. Scholarship recipients will receive free registration (a \$199 US value) to OverDrive's user group conference, Digipalooza, August 2-4, 2017 in Cleveland, Ohio.

What does "*Trifolium repens* forma *minus*" mean? What was it replaced with?

Thank you to Lisa Semenza from the <u>Hazard Library Association</u> and Martha Nettleton from the <u>Kellogg Free Library</u> who both answered correctly with the **original Shamrock of Ireland.** Shamrock is the common name for several unrelated herbaceous plants with trifoliate leaves. White clover, *Trifolium repens* forma *minus*, family Leguminosae, was the original

shamrock of Ireland; *T. procumbens* is now commonly used.
