
From the Director



Next Friday, April 28, the YSS Conference (Youth Services) Section of NYLA) comes to Ithaca. The conference has not been held in Ithaca for over thirty years, but thanks to the hard work of Conference Chair Amanda Schiavulli and a committee comprised of some of our member libraries, close to 200 youth services librarians and staff from all over New York State will get to enjoy this excellent conference. Although Ithaca is the largest city in Tompkins County, it does not have a conference center large enough to hold large crowds outside Cornell University and Ithaca College. Because of this, the conference name "Out of the Box" has a special meaning, as Amanda and the committee had to undertake creative scheduling to host such a large event. The conference will begin at the State Theatre in downtown Ithaca, and breakout sessions will occur at Cinemapolis and the Tompkins County Public Library.

The YSS Conference has a great lineup of programs on a variety of topics. Program topics include community partnerships, yoga storytime, Minecraft basics, supporting homeschoolers, sensory-friendly libraries, grant writing, retailing your library space, and summer STEAM camps. 


Professional Collection Highlight

Celebrate Choose Privacy Week May 1-7

In the uncertain climate of the world, privacy concerns are more prevalent than ever. Choose Privacy Week is the American Library Association's annual, week-long event that promotes the importance of individual privacy rights and celebrates libraries and librarians' unique role in protecting privacy in the library and in society as a whole. The initiative encourages <u>libraries to be champions of privacy rights</u> in the digital age and highlights ways libraries can protect the privacy of their patrons and educate persons to think critically and make informed choices about their privacy.

The American Library Association (ALA) has developed this website (https://chooseprivacyweek.org) as a clearinghouse for resources to improve privacy practices and programs to spark thought and discussion around privacy issues today.

Privacy Tips

PROTECT PERSONAL INFORMATION

- Delete your browsing history: Simply use the browser tools available to delete your cookies and history when you are finished using a public computer. This will help to maintain your privacy and keep your information more secure.
- Log out: Anyone can access public computers.
 Close all browser tabs and log out of your accounts (some computers do this automatically but it is good to confirm). You wouldn't want just anyone to have access to your personal information and accounts.

PRACTICE SECURITY FOR PRIVACY

- Look for the "s": Make sure sites are security enabled. Look for web addresses with "https://" or "shttp://", which means the site takes extra measures to help secure your information. "Http://" is not secure.
- Get savvy about Wi-Fi hotspots: To protect your privacy, do not conduct personal transactions on Wi-Fi hotspots or public computers that request sensitive information such as bank account information, home address or your social security number. Wait to conduct these transactions on a private home computer.

Scam of the Week

Scam of the Week: It's Not a WhatsApp Voice Mail!

You probably know that the Eastern European cyber mafia does their beta testing in the U.K., before they "export" their criminal campaigns to America. Here is a heads-up of a social engineering phish that was spotted in Ireland, and that your users may receive

in their inbox in the near future. Warn them ahead of time!

ESET Ireland warned: "A dangerous email spam message is dropping into Irish mailboxes, pretending to come from WhatsApp. Its subject says "Missed voicemail" and the content of the mail just says "New voicemessage" and has a link called "Play".

Clicking on the link will begin the download of a trojan that ESET detects as "JS/Kryptik.BBC", a variant of malware first detected in August 2016. JS/Kryptik is a generic detection of malicious obfuscated JavaScript code embedded in HTML pages that usually redirects the browser to a malicious URL or implements a specific exploit and can cause ransomware and other malware infections."

I suggest you send the following to your employees, friends, and family. Feel free to copy, paste, and/or edit:

"Criminal hackers are constantly trying to trick people into clicking on links or open attachments they did not ask for. Their new "scam of the week" is to send you an email that looks like it comes from WhatsApp and claims it is a voice mail left for you. It's not.

Do not click on the "Play" button. If you do, your computer will get infected with malware which can cause your identity to get stolen, or all your (or the organization's) files held for ransom.

Here is a general safety rule: Instead of clicking a link in an unverified email claiming it's from WhatsApp (or any other social media) log in to your WhatsApp account the standard way instead and check for any messages there. Remember: "When in doubt, throw it out!"

Record Sets:

These are groupings of items or patrons. After creating a record set, you can also conveniently apply a bulk change to a group of items or patrons. *Please remember to delete older record sets that are no longer needed!!*


1. Go to **File à New** or click the New button.



- 2. Select **Record Set** and click on **OK**.
- 3. Select Item (or Patron) and click OK.



4. Enter a Name to identify this record set and any Notes you wish to enter. Follow the standard naming convention established by FLLS, ex. POP New Books. Improperly named record sets can and will be deleted without advance notification.



- 5. You may now add items to this record set by **Scanning** their barcodes.
- 6. Or **Searching** for them using the Find Tool.
- Once you have added all the item records to the record set, save the set by clicking on the Save icon.

Deadline: May 12, 2017

Libraries, schools, universities and community organizations are encouraged to apply. Grants are awarded at two levels: \$1,000 and \$2,500.

Best Small Library in America

Deadline: July 17, 2017

The award, founded to encourage and showcase the exemplary work of these libraries, is now in its 11th round. It honors the U.S. public library that most profoundly demonstrates outstanding service to populations of 25,000 or less.

When Abraham Lincoln was shot at Ford's Theatre in Washington, D.C., on April 14, 1865, he was carrying the following:

- Two pairs of spectacles and a lens polisher
- Pocketknife
- Watch fob
- Linen handkerchief
- Brown leather wallet containing a five-dollar Confederate note
- Nine newspaper clippings, including several favorable to the president and his policies. These items were given to his son, Robert Todd Lincoln, upon Lincoln's death. Learn more about the items and see them up close in this video.
