From The Director



On Monday, September 18, FLLS Outreach Librarian Jenny Shonk and I facilitated a trustee meet and greet for Cortland County trustees. Held at the Cortland Free Library, we had almost 20 trustees from four of the five Cortland County libraries come together for a night of sharing ideas and discussing advocacy efforts. As you will hear me say many times throughout the year, advocacy for our libraries just doesn't take place in February/March when Advocacy Day is held. Instead, all of us – trustees, directors, staff, and even our patrons – should be advocating for our libraries and stable, sustainable funding.

The issues facing Cortland County trustees and libraries are issues facing all of our member libraries. We discussed the limitations of the tax cap, and how many of our libraries fear going above the tax cap for increased funding. How often to ask for a ballot increase and what amount libraries should be asking was discussed, again with trustees stating that they feared a negative community reaction to asking for an increase, or a fear of failing at the ballot. How our libraries are being marketed and running an effective PR campaign was another topic we talked about.

All of the issues I mentioned above are items that we can help you with at FLLS. Our goal is to strengthen our services for all of our libraries and to especially help libraries seek out secure funding opportunities. This can happen in many ways, including advocating for library funding on a national level, making sure our libraries are aware of the yearly advocacy efforts of NYLA, speaking to the elected officials in our five counties, and helping our libraries advocate for stronger funding on a more local level such as towns and villages. Making sure our directors and all of our trustees have the knowledge of relevant library issues is also something we work on constantly with our libraries.

Our meeting Monday night in Cortland County was a first step in strengthen trustee education and advocacy efforts for those five libraries. Our next step is to work in marketing and ballot funding ideas for some of our libraries. Remember that our upcoming Annual Meeting on October 13th will offer our libraries a great trustee training opportunity and an opportunity for all of us to think about transformational libraries.

Scam of the Week

Your Politics Have Been Breached

Gizmodo reported on a blog post by IT Security company UpGuard which revealed the largest US voter data leak to date. Political data gathered on **more than 198 million US citizens** was exposed this month after a marketing firm contracted by the

Republican National Committee stored internal documents on a publicly accessible Amazon server and was available for 12 days for anyone with the URL.

The 1.1 terabytes of data includes birthdates, home addresses, telephone numbers and political views of nearly 62% of the entire US population. UpGuard cyber risk analyst Chris Vickery discovered Deep Root's data online.

But wait, there's more...

Apart from personal details, the data also contained citizens' suspected religious affiliations, ethnicities and political biases, such as where they stood on controversial topics like gun control, the right to abortion and stem cell research.

This type of data can easily be used for nefarious purposes, from identity fraud to harassment or intimidation of people who hold an opposing political view. *Worst of all, this is a spear phishing gold mine!*

Who got their hands on this data?

It's not clear. What we know for sure is that UpGard's Chris Vickery found it. Twelve days on the Internet is a very long time. Bad guys are scanning for misconfigured databases 24/7 so the chances are high.

In a statement, Deep Root founder Alex Lundry told Gizmodo, "We take full responsibility for this situation." He said the data included proprietary information as well as publicly available voter data provided by state government officials. "Since this event has come to our attention, we have updated the access settings and put protocols in place to prevent further access," Lundry said.

First, deny everything...

Deep Root's data was exposed after the company updated its security settings on June 1, Lundry said. Deep Root has retained Stroz Friedberg, a cybersecurity and digital forensics firm, to investigate. "Based on the information we have gathered thus far, we do not believe that our systems have been hacked," Lundry added. Yeah, right. First, you deny everything. 

Take Me Out for Some Ice Cream Tune: *Take Me Out to the Ball Game*


Take me out for some ice cream, take me out to the store.

Project You: More than 50 Ways to calm down by Aubre Andrus



Polaris Tip of the Week

Ad hoc Bulk Change

- Open the Find Tool. Customize your search so that you pull up the desired records. Click on the Branches tab and click on the **Unselect All** button. Then, click on the checkbox next to your library so you only bring in items from your collection.
- 2. Click on the **Search** button. Once the search is complete look in the lower right corner of the Item Find Tool. You will see the number of records retrieved. Press the **Ctrl+Shift+A** buttons on your keyboard to retrieve all the records into the Item Find Tool.
- 3. At this point you can perform an "Ad hoc Bulk Change" on your items. Select all the items by pressing the **Ctrl+A** on your keyboard which will highlight all the items in the results section. Right click on one of the highlighted items and then left click on the "Ad hoc Bulk Change" from the pop up menu.



4. The Item Record Bulk Change window that comes up should look familiar. Make your selections for the desired change and click **OK**. Follow the prompts to complete the Bulk Change.
