From The Director



As we come to the end of 2017, I thought it would be a good time to reflect on some of the projects or issues we worked on over the year. Nationally, libraries and librarians dealt with the topic of fake news, libraries as safe spaces and social justice on a level we haven't seen before. When the proposed cuts to IMLS occurred this spring, over 1,000 librarians from almost every state took part in National Library Legislative Day – the largest crowd ever. I was part of the New York delegation and we had over 20 system directors, librarians, staff, trustees and patrons make up our delegation. Our regional library council, the South Central Regional Library Council, created their first ever Social Justice Summit that was held in Binghamton in

July. Almost 100 library workers throughout the State attended the day-long workshop, and plans are being made for a follow up conference. The battle for net neutrality is still raging, with lawsuits immediately filed after the ruling last week. Just over the past few weeks, we have seen more and more library articles on a national level exploring the social and economic injustice of library fines.

At a system level, our libraries and trustees worked on revising the minimum standards for public libraries in New York State. We held county meetings, had our trustees and directors take part in surveys, and so far over 100 people throughout the State have made public comments during the open comment phase of the project. FLLS co-sponsored a Library Trustee Association trustee workshop in Binghamton in May that saw close to 100 people receive financial and legal training for trustees. Thanks to the hard work of Member Services librarian Amanda Schiavulli and our fabulous team of local directors and Youth Services library staff from throughout our system, we sponsored the YSS Conference in downtown Ithaca – a first in over 30 years. Our consulting statistics for our system continue to increase every year, with more outreach to our member libraries, grant help, workshops, and trustee training.

2018 looks to be a challenging year for library funding. As I disclosed two weeks ago, NYLA and the State Library have discussed the possibility of a State-wide cut of up to 10%. With the majority of our operating budget dependent on State money, this would be catastrophic to our System. Our Board is reviewing our 2018 budget with these possible cuts in mind, and I will be meeting with FLLS staff and member library directors over the next month to discuss funding scenarios. Advocacy efforts on all levels – personal visits to elected

officials, emails, and phone calls – will be needed in the next two months. This week all 23 public library system directors signed a letter to Governor Cuomo urging him to fund libraries; our first step in 2018 advocacy efforts. We will be sending out advocacy alerts in the next few weeks, so be sure to watch for them.

Thank you for all of your hard work and dedication to your libraries over the past year. We couldn't do it without all of your help. Have a wonderful holiday season, and a very happy New Year.



New Year Tech Tip:

Easy Photo Sharing From Your SmartPhone with Dropbox

If you've ever used your smartphone to take photos or videos during summer reading events, at meetings, or other programs in your library and found it to be a hassle to offload them to your computer for use on your website, in a flyer, or to send via email, this tip may be for you.

Dropbox.com offers 2GB of free cloud storage where you can host photos, documents, and even software installs. It can be accessed through a web browser at dropbox.com but they also offer a Windows desktop client and apps for iPhone and Android phones.

Go to Dropbox and register for a free account (https://www.dropbox.com/register). Once you register, download the Dropbox Windows client (https://www.dropbox.com/install) and install it. You'll be asked to log into the client with the same userid and password you created your account with. Once you've installed Dropbox, it will add an icon in the Windows System Tray in the lower right corner of your screen. You can access your Dropbox folder by double-clicking that icon.




On your iPhone or Android phone, go to the App Store (iPhone) or Play Store (Android) and search for Dropbox. Install the app from Dropbox, Inc. and log into it with the userid and password you registered with on Dropbox.com.


If you've taken photos or videos on your phone that you want to use from your computer, go to your photo gallery and select any photos you want to upload. On Android phones, tap and hold on the first photo or video you want to share until selection is turned on. Then then tap each additional photo or video you want to upload.



Choose to share the photos and in the sharing dialog box, find Dropbox and tap it. You can then share the photos into the default Dropbox folder or you can create a new folder. After you tap the Share button, the photos will upload to your Dropbox cloud storage account. Once in the cloud, they'll automatically sync to the computer that has the Dropbox client installed. You can then open the photos on your computer and use them in any application you'd like.

The free Dropbox account has 2GB of storage so you may not want to permanently store all of your photos and documents there. If you delete a file from the Dropbox folder on your Windows computer it will also delete it from the Dropbox cloud storage. Or, you can move a file from the Dropbox folder on your computer and put it in Documents, Pictures, Videos or other folder. That will save it to your computer permanently and remove it from the Dropbox cloud, freeing up some of your 2GB limit.

Deleting a photo or video from Dropbox does not remove it from your phone. Likewise, deleting a photo or video from your phone's gallery doesn't remove it from Dropbox or your synched Windows computer.



Polaris Tip of the Week

Adding Notes when Waiving Fines:

Many libraries do not use a cash register, so all cash exchanges (donations, copies, etc.) are tracked in Polaris through patron accounts. It is a great idea for all staff-waived fees to contain a note that can be checked by the director. In **Patron Status (F6)**, after selecting a fine to waive and clicking on the **Waive** button (circled below), enter the necessary info into the note field. Include why the fines are being waived and your initials.
