

From the Director

Last week, NYLA held a Legislative Committee with public library system representation from the Four County, Pioneer, Ramapo Catskill, Suffolk, Upper Hudson, and Queen Library Systems. NYLA heard from more than one staffer that NYLA's timing was good, as legislators are working on their responses to the Executive Budget, and that libraries are definitely on the table during those discussions.

While the Senate staff reported that they plan to advocate on the behalf of libraries again this year, this budget year is extremely hard and they cannot make any assurances about what the negotiated budget will look like. With cuts in other parts of the Governor's budget, more people are asking for budget restorations – meaning we still have to work to get our message across.

We still need your help in advocacy efforts. Please consider signing up and joining us in Albany on March 1 for Advocacy Day. We especially need participants from Tioga and Cayuga County at this point. Call your legislators if you haven't already, and if you are a library director, urge your Board to call also. Invite legislators to your libraries – show off your spaces, your programs, and your accomplishments. As Rebekkah Smith Aldrich reminded system leaders this week: "Libraries are well positioned, as always, to address many of the concerns this year has presented us with – we've got to help legislators make that connection if they haven't made if for themselves."





TCPL to Close Starting Next Week:

Starting Friday, February 3 (today) TCPL will be doubling the limits on DVDs and audiobooks in anticipation of our closing. We are NOT doubling the total amount of items a patron can check out since it is already a generous 50. Normally they are limited to 5 audiobooks and

5 DVDs, but we are doubling that to 10 each. Also, starting next Thursday morning (February 9) we will not be filling hold requests for our patrons or other libraries' patrons. When we reopen on Monday, February 20 we will go back to 5 DVDs and 5 audiobooks. Click away from the story to investigate the site, its mission and its contact info.



CHECK THE AUTHOR

Do a quick search on the author. Are they credible? Are they real?



CHECK THE DATE

Reposting old news stories doesn't mean they're relevant to current events.



CHECK YOUR BIASES

Consider if your own beliefs could affect your judgement.



Headlines can be outrageous in an effort to get clicks. What's the whole story?



SUPPORTING SOURCES?

Click on those links. Determine if the info given actually supports the story.



If it is too outlandish, it might be satire. Research the site and author to be sure.



Ask a librarian, or consult a fact-checking site.

Summer Reading Registration Software Update

Wandoo Reader trials can be requested starting now, and the trial period will end on **March 31**, **2017**.

The state will be updating the online registration page for Wandoo Reader on the *Summer Reading at New York Libraries* site next week.

Here are the basics from Evanced:

Wandoo Reader Trial Site

- 1. A library can run Wandoo Reader OR Classic Summer Reader, but cannot run both.
- A library can choose to have a test site of Wandoo Reader, but that trial period ends March 31, 2017
- A library can request a Wandoo Reader trial/ test site here: https://evanced.typeform.com/to/O75CAg
- 4. If a library has never had Classic Summer Reader site, they can request a new Wandoo Reader "live" site at the link above as well (just choose the appropriate option).

YA Book of the Week:



Hitler's Last Days: The Death of the Nazi Regime and the World's Most Notorious Dictator by Bill O'Reilly

By early 1945, the destruction of the German Nazi State seems certain. The Allied forces, led by American generals George S. Patton and Dwight D. Eisenhower, are gaining control of Europe, leaving German leaders scrambling. Facing defeat, Adolf Hitler flees to a secret bunker with his new wife, Eva Braun, and his beloved dog, Blondi. It is there that all three would meet their end, thus ending the Third Reich and one of the darkest chapters of history. Hitler's Last Days is a gripping account of the death of one of the most reviled villains of the 20th century—a man whose regime of murder and terror haunts the world even today. Adapted from Bill O'Reilly's historical thriller Killing Patton, this book will have young readers—and grown-ups too—hooked on history. This thoroughly-researched and documented book can be worked into multiple

aspects of the common core curriculum.



Polaris Tip of the Week

Standards for Inserting Information in the Volume Field of a Multi-Part Set:

The following examples will help to define and clarify the standardizations that should be used when entering information in the volume field of a multi-part set. A multi-part set is defined as any item that includes multiple parts and is packaged as such. The number of discs in each case determines what information goes in the volume field.

For example:

245 04	‡aThe Transformers.‡h[videorecording]‡nSeasons three and four /

260	‡aLos Angeles, CA :‡bShout! Factory,‡cc2010.

If these four discs are packaged all together in one case the volume field should contain the following information:

d. 1-4Note: there is a space between the period and the first number. If the space is left out or additional spaces are added it won't match during the holds processing. If these four discs are packaged in two cases the volume fields should contain the following information:

d. 1-2

d. 3-4

If these four discs are packaged separately in individual cases the volume fields should contain the following information:

- d. 1
- d. 2
- d. 3
- d. 4

Copy information; i.e. c. 1 and/or c. 2 should ONLY be entered into the COPY field. Please follow the above standardized format for all multi-set items.
