From the Director




On Thursday, February 16, I participated in NYLA's first ever Town Hall in preparation for Advocacy Day on Wednesday, March 1. Led by NYLA Director Jeremy Johannesen, NYLA Director of Government Relations Mike Neppl and Coordinator for Library Sustainability at Mid-Hudson Library System Rebekkah Smith Aldrich also gave insight on the budget process. Over the last ten years, almost \$111 has been lost from library aid, making this year's advocacy efforts even more important.

Thanks to everyone who has signed up to ride our bus to Albany – we have over 30 people attending and have representation from all five

counties. If you are attending that day, NYLA sent an email on Thursday announcing that there will be a DIY rally poster station in the "Well" of the Legislative Office Building before the rally at noon. Poster board and markers will be supplied by NYLA on a first come, first serve basis. I've already heard that some of our libraries are already busy making their own posters, so please be creative!

Our expanded talking points and legislative guide went out in the delivery this morning, so please look for them at your libraries over the coming days. Talking points will also be reviewed on the bus ride to Albany. One tip I learned yesterday from Rebekkah is to always remember to phrase your talking points to the legislators as "We believe your constituents deserve adequate library funding because..." Legislators like to be reminded what is important to their constituents, such as wifi accessibility in rural areas, or construction aid money for aging buildings seeking important renovations.



Scam of the Week

Scam of the Week: Valentine's Day Phishing Attacks

It is time to remind your users that heartless con artists use social engineering tactics to trick people looking for love.

The FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center warns every year that scammers use poetry, flowers, and other gifts to reel in victims, the entire time declaring their "undying love."

These callous criminals -- who also troll social media sites and chat rooms in search of romantic victims -- usually claim to be Americans traveling or working abroad. In reality, they often live overseas and it's a whole industry with planned criminal campaigns focused on days like this.

Do not trust emails or advertising from online florists or other gift retailers until you are sure that they are valid. Otherwise, you might be turning over your credit card information to a scammer or infect your computer with malicious software.



Do not trust an online greeting card, particularly if it does not indicate who sent it to you. Be very wary of a card sent by "a secret admirer." Even if you recognize the name, confirm that it was really sent from that person before you click on the link and open the card.

Do not trust special deliveries, there is no special charge for alcohol so if someone requires a credit card payment for such a delivery, just politely decline knowing you just dodged a bullet.

Do not trust anyone who indicates he or she is in love with you and then wants to communicate with you right away on an email account outside of the dating site, claiming to be working abroad, asking for your address and poor grammar which is often a sign of a foreign romance scammer. Many romance scams originate in Eastern Europe...

Inch by inch, row by row Someone bless these seeds I sow. Someone warm them from below 'Till the rain comes tumbling down.



YA Book of the Week:



Blood, Bullets and Bones: The Story of Forensic Science from Sherlock Holmes to DNA by Bridget Heos

Gr 8 Up—The use of DNA evidence by forensic scientists to help solve crimes is a relatively new innovation. It was only in 1994 that the FBI created a database of DNA samples from convicted and suspected criminals called the Combined DNA Index System (CODIS). However, the field of forensic science has been around for centuries. In fact, as early as 270 CE there was Zhang Ju, a Chinese coroner who wrote about the crimes he solved by examining the bodies of the victims. Using numerous real-life cases, Heos presents a riveting


history of the evolution of modern forensic science. One of the first scientific tests ever developed in relation to murder was one for determining the presence of poison, in particular arsenic. This 18th-century breakthrough laid the groundwork for countless other developments in the quest to solve crimes. Heos deftly incorporates the stories behind many murders to illuminate advancements in areas such as fingerprint evidence, firearm and blood pattern analysis, and forensic anthropology (how bodies decompose). Also covered are the rise of the medical examiner, the advent of criminal profilers, and the development of DNA evidence. The text, with photographs sprinkled throughout, is gripping and easy to read but not for the faint of heart. VERDICT Sherlock Holmes lovers, CSI: Miami aficionados, and forensic science students will all be drawn to this rather gruesome yet highly entertaining and fact-packed history.—Ragan O'Malley, Saint Ann's School, Brooklyn



Polaris Tip of the Week

Checking Hold Statuses:

Is a patron's hold request taking an unusually long time? Discover more information about a specific hold request by checking the hold status. Go to **Patron Status** (**F6**) -> **Hold Requests**. Under **Status** you may see various terms like *Active*, *Pending*, *Shipped*, *or Unclaimed*. *Active* means that a hold request <u>is not</u> linked to an item, whereas a status of *Pending* means the hold request <u>is</u> linked to an item. Right click on a hold request and click on **Item Record** to view more information about the linked item or click on **Holds Queue** to see a patron's place in line. Attached to the bulletin is the full list of hold statuses with definitions and possible actions to take.

These mini-grants are awarded to public schools, public libraries, and public preschool programs that provide free, creative, and innovative programs that support or extend the Learning Standards for children ages preschool-grade 12.

Support for Digitizing Cultural Resources

Deadline: April 3, 2017

Grants, ranging from a minimum of \$50,000 to a maximum of \$250,000 in the case of a single-institution project or \$500,000 for a collaborative project, will be provided to colleges and universities, research centers, museums, libraries, historical societies, cultural associations, etc.
