CHOCOLATE TOURNAMENT AUGUST 24 - 28, 2015

The Chocolate Tournament was a weeklong series of events combining children's literature with games, relays, crafts, and music all about chocolate. We gave out prizes at many of the events. Of course, this involved chocolate and other types of candy, but it also included bookmarks, stickers, tattoos, "Beanie Babies" and BEST OF ALL, FREE BOOKS!

Free tickets were needed for the events and given out on a first-come, first-served basis 30 minutes before program start times. (The child had to be present to receive a ticket.) Teen volunteers added greatly to the success of the Tournament!

The one-page Tournament flier that was distributed to the public listed the names, dates and times of the individual events. Detailed descriptions of the activities for each event were included in the library's online calendar. Those details are presented in this document along with additional comments from our experience with this program.

Monday, August 24

11:00 a.m. - Tournament Event: Chocolate Trivia Game (Gr. K-6)

- · Picture Book Reading: I Love Chocolate by David Cali
- Chocolate Trivia Game
 Most of the questions came from simple "Google" searches on the term "chocolate
 trivia" as well as different kinds of chocolate products including candies, cookies and
 even cocoa. See handout for questions used.
- Craft: Dirt Cups
 See handout for recipe. The biggest hit was the Cool Whip!

4:00 p.m. - Tournament Event: Super Heroes Love Chocolate Concentration Game (Gr. 1-6)

This was the classic Concentration Game with 30 picture cards comprised of 15 pairs is a great way to set any theme into a fun, teamwork activity. We used a large roll-out blackboard with a cork side makes a perfect game board. We made pairs of colored pictures taken right off the internet and simply glued them on 5"x8" index cards. These were randomly stapled onto the cork board -- 6 rows across-5 cards down. Index cards numbered 1 through 30 were used to cover the picture cards using

push pins. The children were divided into 4 teams. Chocolate prizes included chocolate chip cookies, fudgsicle pops, hershey kisses, rollo candies and M&Ms!

7:00 p.m. - Trove @ the Movies: "Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory (Children and Families)

Tuesday, August 25

11:00 a.m. - Tournament Event: Hershey Kiss Challenge (Gr. K-6)

- · Picture Book Reading: Little Mouse and the Big Cupcake by Thomas Taylor
- Mitten/Kiss Competition
 We divided up into teams. Each person had to put on a pair of winter gloves/mittens, proceed quickly to the other side of the room, pick up a chocolate kiss, return to the startline, hand the gloves/mittens to the next teammate and sit down and eat the kiss.
- Hershey Kiss Scavenger Hunt
 See the handout for a description and lists of places and items for the hunt.
- Craft: Hershey Kiss Mice
 See handout for directions and templates.

2:00 p.m. - Marimba Concert by Simon Boyar - There is chocolate in the music! (Gr. K-6)

Simon Boyar demonstrated how simple percussion instruments can be made out of jars filled with M&M's!

Wednesday, August 26

4:30 p.m. - Tournament Event: Snack & Chat / Come y Comenta (in English and Spanish (Gr. 2-4)

- Picture Book Reading: Grandma's Chocolate / El chocolate de abuelita by Mara Price (read aloud in English and Spanish)
- Bilingual charades based on the book
- Craft: Chocolate Bar Butterflies (Hershey Bars were taped to Ellison Cut butterflies to form the butterflies' bodies. Butterflies were decorated with markers and sequins.

7:00 p.m. - "The Little Red Hen" by Rosy Puppets (Ages 3+)

Everyone enjoyed a chocolate chip cookie after the show! Rosy the Hen taught everyone how to say the Bate Bate Chocolate Rhyme:

Uno, dos, tres - CHO Uno, dos, tres - CO Uno, dos, tres - LA Uno, dos, tres - TE! Chocolate, chocolate, bate bate, chocolate, Chocolate, chocolate, bate bate, chocolate

Thursday, August 27

All Day - Tournament Event: The Trove Chocolate Quest: An On-Your-Own Activity (Continued through Thursday, September 3)

Search in The Trove for answers to questions about chocolate. This included a Tootsie Roll guessing jar. Children received Tootsie Rolls for completing the Quest. Winners of the Tootsie Roll guessing activity received Chocolate Kisses and books for prizes. See Chocolate Quest: An On-Your-Own Activity form.

4:30 p.m. - Tournament Event: Candy Bingo

- Picture Book Reading: Whopper Cake by Karma Wilson
- Candy Bingo Game
 We used the Candy Bingo game from Kim's Kandy Kreations at (kimskandykreations.net).
 Thirty bingo cards, which come in a jpeg file, are available for download for \$5.00.
 Prizes included candy, stickers, coloring sheets, "Beanie Babies" and free books.
- · Craft: M&M Cupcake Decorating Competition

Friday, August 28

11:00 a.m. - Tournament Event: Chocolate Bar Relays (Gr. K-6)

- Picture Book Reading: A Chocolate Calamity by David Slonim
- Chocolate Bar Walk"

This was conducted like a cake walk. Sixteen sheets of 8 1/2" x 11" paper were arranged in a circle on the floor with plenty of space between each sheet. On every other sheet we had a picture of a chocolate bar or "Beanie Baby." When the music played the children walked around on the sheets. When the music stopped, they could pick a chocolate bar or Beanie Baby if they had landed one of those pictures. If they landed on a blank sheet, they would have to try again when the music played. The game continued until everyone had gotten a chocolate bar and Beanie Baby."

- "KitKat" Car Relay.
 - We taped "KitKat" bars to "Hot Wheels" cars and raced them.
- "Fruit Gem" spoon Relay race.

 Everyone had to see how quickly they could load a "Fruit Gem" candy on a soup spoon and get back to the team to hand the spoon off to the next person.
- "Peppermint Paddy" Shuffle
 We pushed "Peppermint Paddy" candies on a table to see how far they would go.
 Everyone received a free book after participating in the last three relays.

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
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COMPILATION OF RESPONSES TO REQUEST FOR EXPERIENCES WITH "CHOCOLATE OLYMPICS" TYPE OF PROGRAM

(ALSC & PUBYAC Listservs)

Hi All,

A few weeks ago I asked on both the ALSC and PUBYAC listservs if anyone would like to share experiences with a "chocolate olympics" type of program. At long last I have found the time to compile the responses. Here goes...

The first responder (Pat Connor, Lyell Branch Library, Rochester, NY), wrote that they had been advised to not call something an "Olympics" due to copyright. She referred me to:

I had certainly not even considered that this would be an issue. But, as we moved forward in our planning, We took this copyright issue into account and actually changed the name of our upcoming event to "Chocolate Tournament." But, I will write more on our plans at the end of this email. First, I want to list the activities that people on both listservs shared. Here they are...

From Minerta Lippert, Dwight Foster Public Library, Fort Atkinson, WI -

5 or 6 competitive games involving chocolate: M & M sorting, the unicorn challenge (teams try to stack oreos on someone's forehead), an unwrapping race, a donut relay (teens carry a donut hole on a spoon and pass it off without dropping it), a chocolate puzzle (break a chocolate bar and have the teens put it back together). The program is for grades 6 - 12 and last for about an hour.

From Erica Testani, Lewis Egerton Smoot Memorial Library, King George, VA:

Pictionary in chocolate sauce, scoot a whopper along a track made of duct tape with noses while on knees, oreo tower contest, tape plastic painters sheeting to table and put Hershey's syrup in the middle of the table -- kids dip their fingers into the syrup, find clear spaces on the table, and start drawing.

From Cristina Dolcetti, Moose Jaw, SK:

Build Prince Pondicherry's Castle (from "Charlie and the Chocolate Factory") with toothpicks, chocolate, marshmallows, other small candy, run the classic egg and spoon relay race with chocolate eggs, play checkers with chocolate coins.

From Heather Thompson:

Whoppers nose race, relay in which kids unwrap and eat a Hershey kiss while wearing oven mitts, candy bar cross section quiz, chocolate bar pictionary, (using a mini Hershey bar for drawing on paper, chocolate testing (milk up throughly extremely dark). One-hour program for 20 kids, grades 4 through 6.

Jennifer Rank, Portland Library, Portland, CT:

Teams made posters that would be their flags (flags included names of teams), sorted M & Ms by colors, pushed Whoppers with noses, unwrapping Hershey kisses with oven mitts, shuffle board with Hershey minis, chocolate trivia questions ending with awards ceremony. Awards were Hershey kisses glued onto circles of construction paper (gold, silver, purple) to represent first, second and third place. There were 20 kids in grades K - 5 during February Chocolate Olympics.

From Anne LaRoche, Frances L. Simek Library, Medford, WI:

Put a racetrack down using masking tape. Kids used elbows to roll ball on track.

From Jane McManus:

Not Olympics but try "Loco for Cocoa" Program (follow the link):

So, after reading what others have done, we have put together a plan for what we think will work in The Trove at The White Plains Public Library for our "Chocolate Tournament" this summer. We have scheduled it as a week long series of events for children in grades K - 6 from August 24 through 28, the last week before White Plains public schools open. It will be a sweet ending to summer vacation! The events will combine children's literature with games, relays, crafts, music and other activities all about chocolate. An overview of the program includes:

Chocolate Trivia Game (preceded by a reading of *I Love Chocolate* by David Cali and followed by a dirt cup craft)

"Super Heroes Love Chocolate" Concentration Game

Hershey Kiss Challenge (preceded by a reading of *Little Mouse and the Big Cupcake* by Thomas Taylor and followed by a mitten/kiss competition, Hershey Kiss scavenger hunt, and Hershey kiss mice craft).

Marimba Concert by Simon Boyer - He has agreed to play some chocolate marimba music!

Snack & Chat / Come & Comenta (a reading of *Grandma's Chocolate / El chocolate de abuelita* by Mara Price in English and Spanish followed by word games).

The Trove Chocolate Quest: An On-Your-Own Activity (runs for a week during which kids search for answers about chocolate in the library).

Candy Bingo (preceded by a reading of *Whopper Cake* by Karma Wilson and followed by an M & M / Skittle cupcake decorating competition).

Chocolate Bar Relays (begins with a reading of *A Chocolate Calamity* by David Slonim followed by the relays - Kit Cat car relay, Peppermint Paddy Shuffle, Spoon Relay and chocolate bar walk.)

Movies: "Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory" and Charlie and the Chocolate Factory"

There may be some slight modifications as we work through the details, but this is the basic plan.

Thank you, everyone, who shared their experiences! Good luck to anyone else who is planning a "chocolate" event!



Description

HERSHEY KISS MOUSE Craft

MATERIALS

Hershey Kisses Double sided tape Regular tape (sticky on one side only) Card stock (pink, tan, yellow) Rick Rack trim (any color) Sticker eyes

INSTRUCTIONS

- Cut from card stock: 2 ears (pink), 1 set of feet (tan) and 1 piece of cheese (yellow).
- Cut 3-inch length of Rick Rack trim.
- Place a small piece of doubled sided tape on the flat ends of 2 Hershey Kisses.
- Place 2 ears on the flat end of 1 of the kisses.
- Press the flat ends of the kisses together.
- Using double sided tape, attach the feet to the cheese.
- Place a small piece of double sided tape on top of the feet on the cheese.
- · Place the kisses on the feet, with the seam between the flat ends of the 2 kisses in the middle of the feet.

Using regular tape, attach the Rick Rack trim to the side of the pointed end of 1 of the kisses.

Press sticker eyes to the side of the pointed end of the other kiss. Enjoy your mouse for as long as you can before eating the kisses! TEMPLATES


