### FROM THE DIRECTOR



We have some state and federal updates for you this week:

**State Legislation Work** - Earlier this week the Senate Library Committee unanimously passed three bills relevant to public libraries. One was trustee training, another was the 90/10 construction grant match, and the third was a bill that would make all libraries eligible to use DASNY for capital financing so they would not all need to have a separate piece of legislation to be eligible.

The hope is that the Assembly Committee will take up all three bills, and hopefully move those in the next week or two. Once they go to the full legislative bodies, NYLA will be providing strategies for us to get them passed. We will be sending out more information when that occurs.

As for the trustee training bill, I wrote a letter of support for that bill as Chair of PULISDO. In addition to PULISDO's support letter, NYLA has also drafted a letter of support. A reminder that the bill would require two hours annually for trustee education for all library trustees in the State. Advocacy calls for further support may be coming, and I will be updating you on that in the coming weeks.

This is also a good time to reminder you that NYLA updates their Advocacy page regularly, so please check that from time to time at <a href="https://www.nyla.org/2021-legislative-session/?">https://www.nyla.org/2021-legislative-session/?</a> menukey=advocacy. **Minimum Standards for Hours** – Over the past two weeks, the State Library has held question and answer webinars for both central library directors and public library directors regarding the upcoming requirement for all libraries in NY State to be open their minimum standard hours by June 1<sup>st</sup>. A reminder that lobby/contactless pickup/library appointment hours count as meeting those hours open. We have been meeting with our libraries since November about this upcoming requirement and all of our libraries are either meeting minimum standard hours or will be by June 1<sup>st</sup>. Thank you for your continued work on this important endeavor.

**Build America's Libraries Act** – Introduced on January 28, 2021 in the Senate by Sen. Jack Reed (D-RI), along with Sens. Bernie Sanders (I-VT), Sheldon Whitehouse (D-RI), and Ron Wyden (D-OR), as well as on March 3, 2021 in the House by Rep. Andy Levin (D-MI-9) and Rep. Don Young (R-AK), the Build America's Libraries Act would fund upgrades to the nation's library infrastructure to address challenges such as natural disasters, COVID-19, broadband capacity, environmental hazards, and accessibility barriers. This groundbreaking legislation would pave the way for new and improved library facilities in underserved communities across the country (from ALA's website at <a href="http://www.ala.org/advocacy/buildlibraries">http://www.ala.org/advocacy/buildlibraries</a>).

On March 31, 2021, President Biden released his infrastructure plan, and it fails to include funding for library facilities. Now is the time to take action and urge President Biden and Congress to support library infrastructure. You can take part in an email advocacy campaign here.

# **COVID-Related Phishing Attacks Return to Mid-Pandemic Heights**

New data from Palo Alto Network's Unit42 provides a wealth of insight into specifically how cybercriminals have leveraged COVID-related theming to ensure a successful phishing attack.

Throughout the last 14 months, the bad guys have consistently kept pace with the state of the pandemic. They have been looking for the best aspects of the COVID saga to get the attention of individuals and businesses alike for these attacks.


According to Unit42's new COVID-19 themed phishing attack data, these scammers know exactly how to press the buttons of their potential victims at just the right time. For example, the current concern is around vaccines. According to Unit42:

- Vaccine-related phishing attacks rose by 530% from December 2020 to February 2021
- Phishing attacks targeting pharmacies and hospitals rose by 189% during that same timeframe

Over the past 14 months phishing attacks have changed their stripes to meet the current state of the potential victim's concerns, fears, needs, and hopes – as shown below.








# Attaching Your Item Record to a Pre-Existing Record or QuickBib

After receiving a new book, check Polaris to see if a Bib record already exists. Go to **Cataloging Bibliographic Records** or **F12** to bring up the Find Tool. Search by ISBN or UPC and make sure to scan the ISBN or UPC to ensure accuracy.



If a Quick Bib or final bibliographic record already exists you should attach your item record to it, as long as the 020 or 024 matches. Under publication date, |||| will be present on Quick Bibs. This indicates that the record is a Quick Bib that was created by another library. The records displayed below are obviously Quick Bibs, identified by the |||| symbol in the Publication date column.



PLEASE REMEMBER: DO NOT ATTACH YOUR ITEM RECORD TO A BIBLIOGRAPHIC RECORD UNLESS THE ISBN MATCHES! We are seeing many instances where a <u>large print book</u> is attached to a <u>regular print book</u> record. These books have completely different ISBNs and belong on separate records.
