FROM THE DIRECTOR



After days of delay, we finally have a State budget. Here is a breakdown of what it means for FLLS and other news:

State Budget - On Saturday, New York State passed their overdue budget. As the days passed, our projected library increases did decrease. However, it is important to note that for 2022, we did make library aid gains of 5.5 million dollars and kept construction

aid the same amount as last year. Both NYALS and PULISDO had discussion this week, and while we are thankful for our increase in library aid, we are committed to start advocacy work now to show these gains cannot be stripped away next year.

The Budget included:

- Library Aid \$99.6M (This equates to a 6% increase which is a gain of roughly \$67,000 for FLLS)
- Library Construction \$34M
- Digital Inclusion \$10M
- Release of \$150K Love Your Library Fund
- Schomburg Research Center \$375K
- Langston Hughes Community Library \$112K
- Establishment of the Working to Implement Reliable and Equitable Deployment of Broadband Act (WIRED)
- Modifications to Open Meetings Law
 - o Memo from Committee on Open Government

Open Meetings Law – Open Meetings Law relaxation was due to sunset on April 15. Earlier this week, the Committee on Open Government released information on a videoconferencing amendment that is in the budget for 2022-2023. You can view the information here. They will be providing written guidance on their website regarding the requirements at a later date. However, please note that in their memo dated April 11, remote meetings can be held until June 8, 2022. Libraries may continue to hold meetings remotely if they so choose.

NYLA's Spring on the Hill - The New York Library Association is doing an in-person advocacy event in Albany in May. Held on May 17 and 18, this Spring on the Hill event will offer a day of continuing education for librarians across NY State and an opportunity to meet with legislators about non-budget advocacy items. There are many great topics for May 17, including sessions on Open Meetings Law, public library referendums, material challenges, and how to run effective meetings. You can learn more and register here.

FLLS Closed Monday, April 18 – Our building will be closed on Monday, April 18 for a spring holiday. Staff will not be working and no deliveries will be made. All libraries will receive a delivery on Tuesday, April 19.





ALA Fighting Fake News through Public Libraries

Wednesday, April 27, 2:00pm

Fake news has become a new constant. Whether it's propaganda, advertainment, or literal fake news, misinformation is not going away. In a world where you can't trust everything you read, where can you turn? Unsurprisingly, many people turn to their local libraries. Public libraries have worked hard to offer programs on this topic, but it can be tricky territory. Politics can be an issue in any library, but public libraries in particular have to be careful about alienating audiences. So, how can we create safe, nonjudgmental opportunities to teach our patrons how to assess information for accuracy, bias, and legitimacy? How can we teach about fake news without it feeling forced or pedantic? By slipping it into programming that your audience wants to know more about! In this free webinar, participants will learn strategies for using information literacy as a gateway to teach about fake news (and have it actually sink in).



T-Mobile Hometown Grants Program for Small and Rural Communities



Deadlines: Quarterly; the last day of each quarter

The T-Mobile Hometown Grants Program intends to help build stronger, more prosperous small towns and rural communities throughout the United States. Up to 100 towns each year for the next five years will receive community improvement grants of up to \$50,000 for projects to build, rebuild, or refresh community spaces that help foster local connections.

The focus is on providing support to revitalize community spaces in towns with 50,000 people or less. Examples of eligible projects include revitalizing a town hall, a senior center, a library, or any space where friends and neighbors gather. Elected leaders, town managers and employees, and nonprofit leaders are eligible to submit applications. The full proposal should be three-five pages, and include a "shovel-ready" plan, and up to 5 letters of support.
