The NYS Budget and Your Library

On April 9th, New York State passed their overdue budget. As the days passed, our projected library increases did decrease. However, it is important to note that for 2022, we did make library aid gains of 5.5 million dollars and kept construction aid the same amount as last year. Both NYALS and PULISDO are thankful for our increase in library aid and are committed to start advocacy work now to show these gains cannot be stripped away next year.

The Budget included:

- Library Aid \$99.6M (This equates to a 6% increase which is a gain of roughly \$67,000 for FLLS)
- Library Construction \$34M
- Digital Inclusion \$10M
- Release of \$150K Love Your Library Fund
- Schomburg Research Center \$375K
- Langston Hughes Community Library \$112K
- Establishment of the Working to Implement Reliable and Equitable Deployment of Broadband Act (WIRED)
- Modifications to Open Meetings Law <u>Memo from Committee on Open Government</u>

STATE AID FOR LIBRARY CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM

The <u>State Aid for Library Construction program</u> provides supplemental funding for projects that support library services and accessibility, including facility efficiency.


NYS approved a \$34M in library construction aid this budget cycle. This aid is distributed among the 23 public library systems. FLLS administers this competitive program for our region by allocating funds based on several factors including a library's ability to meet state-eligibility-guidelines.

Member libraries need to submit construction grant materials to FLLS by close of business, Friday, September 2, 2022. The FLLS Board of Trustees will review applications at their September board meeting. FLLS must then submit materials to the NYS Division of Library Development by October 5th.

A special grant was made this year directly to the system to benefit all member libraries for Museum Pass Project: an Intellectual Curiosity Collaboration. Minimum Standards: Evaluation and Reporting

Of the fourteen <u>Minimum Public Library</u>
<u>Standards</u> there are several that focus on reporting and evaluation:

MS 2: Long-Range Plan

MS 3 Report to the Community
MS 6: Evaluating Effectiveness

The New York State Library's Helpful Information for Meeting Minimum Standards provides some background and tips on how your library can meet these requirements. The Minimum Standards are inter-related, as your Long-Range Plan is a benchmark for your library to measure its effectiveness and impact. This information then gets shared in your community report.
