1. Large Print Books:

Books printed in 14pt or larger type. Almost 30,000 items available.


2. Audiobooks on CD:

Recorded books on compact discs. Over 20,000 items available.

3. Playaway Audiobooks:

Handheld, all-in-one audiobooks. Just plug in your headphones and press play (easy to use, even for people who are blind).

Talking Book and Braille Library

The New York State Talking Book and Braille Library (TBBL) is a free library service for eligible residents of upstate New York who are unable to use standard print materials due to a visual, physical or reading disability.

Materials are mailed to and from library patrons at their homes at no charge. Books can also be downloaded directly to a tablet or smartphone.

The TBBL collection includes print Braille books, and fiction and nonfiction audio and braille books, with over 70 magazine subscriptions available as well.
