FROM THE DIRECTOR

Last week, we learned the sad news of former Tompkins County Public Library Director Janet Steiner's death. Janet played a special role in my library career, as she and Assistant Director Karen Creenan hired me to work at TCPL in 1999. I was fresh out of library school, working at the State Library in Albany, but knew I was interested in public libraries. While the



job ad was appealing as it focused in Adult Services reference, when I interviewed and learned that the library would be moving into a new space (their current space) within the year, I knew it was the job I wanted.

Under Janet's directorship, the move to 101 East Green Street in 2000 was one of her highlights as director. Moving a library is hard; especially the size of a library like TCPL. We were not only planning the physical layout of the building such as where the collection would go, but also something entirely new to us – programming space. When I started at TCPL in 1999, programming for adults was almost entirely non-existent. The space in the old Cayuga Street building was limited and programming was in the basement for the most part, if it occurred at all.

Janet's leadership at TCPL allowed me to discover areas of librarianship that I absolutely loved. She encouraged me to start a readers' advisory focus at TCPL and do everything from ordering the fiction collection, book displays, reading lists and running book clubs. A meeting with Janet, me, and the Vice Provost at Cornell, Isaac Kramnick, lead to a strong multi-year town/gown partnership with Cornell and the creation of an Ithaca Community Read.

Some of the things Janet helped with me as a librarian was the importance of having the library visible in your community, becoming comfortable speaking with donors of all types, crafting a library message, and working with government entities, such as counties, towns and villages. She encouraged me to join boards of local not-for-profits, which to this day helps with our library trustee work. A special moment for me was to be able to invite her to the Finger Lakes Library System open house in 2015 when I became Executive Director of FLLS and show her our new building and thank her again for bringing me to Ithaca back in 1999.

I'm currently out of the office on vacation from August 11 until Monday, August 21. If you need assistance, our librarians Jenny, Heidi and Deb are in the office next week.







With so many resources available, it's easy to forget about what is out there. The Director's Listserv is always a great place to crowdsource ideas.



FLLS is celebrating **Banned Books Week 2023** (October 1-7)!



POLARIS TIP

Logging On & Off Properly

It is critical to log on and off correctly! *Please Note:* When closing Polaris, simply clicking on the X on the toolbar or the Remote Desktop without logging off may cause issues the next time you try to login!

To Log On


Double click on the Remote Desktop/Polaris icon on your computer's desktop. The Remote Desktop will open on your screen and you can double click the Polaris icon along the left-hand side of the screen. Enter your unique User Name and Password. **Note:** Passwords are case sensitive.



Having trouble with your receipt printers? You may have logged onto the Polaris toolbar before the printers were able to map completely. It is recommended that you wait a few seconds before opening the Polaris toolbar to ensure that everything loads correctly.

To Log Off

On the toolbar, go to the File \rightarrow Log Off or Ctrl L, then click OK. Next, go to File \rightarrow Exit to close the toolbar. Lastly, go to the Windows button in the bottom left-hand corner of the screen, right click, move your mouse to Shut down or sign out, and left click on Sign out.
