





<u>Senator Webb Secures \$36,000 in State Funding for Libraries Across the</u> Southern Tier

FROM THE DIRECTOR

Here are some updates from the last few weeks:

NY State Budget – the Senate and Assembly released their one-house budgets the week of March 11. Here are the highlights:

Major Categories	Senate	Assembly
Library Operating Aid	\$104.6M (+2.5M over EB)	\$104.6M (+2.5M over EB)
Library Construction Aid	\$54M (+20M over EB)	\$68M (+34M over EB)
Library Materials Aid	\$11/pupil (Inflation tied to CPI)	\$11/pupil (No inflation increases)
NOVELny	\$3M	\$3M

*EB = Executive Budget

• **Dolly Parton's Imagination Library**: \$2,500,000 (New in Senate One House, not in Assembly). There is interest from Dolly Parton's Imagination Library team to bring this book program to all of NY State. This program sends books monthly through the mail to each child from birth to age 5. This has previously been introduced in the Senate, but this dollar amount was a last minute introduction in the Senate budget.

We are currently in a negotiation phase of the budget cycle. The budget is due to be passed by April 1. There is some feeling that since it is an election year, we should have a budget as close to that date as possible. Please look for more budget information from us in early April.

Solar Eclipse – Did you know that 8 of our 33 libraries will be in the path of totality for the upcoming eclipse on April 8? The libraries in Auburn, Cato, Fair Haven, Port Byron, Seneca Falls, Union Springs, Waterloo and Weedsport all are in the path. Annual Reports – A huge thank you to Jenny Shonk from FLLS for making sure all of our libraries submitted their NY State Annual Reports on time and correctly. A record 29 out of 33 libraries were passed without needing any corrections from our libraries! The libraries that did need corrections were extremely minor and are being completed now. Thank you to our library directors and trustees who helped make this year's

annual report process so smooth.

If you need assistance, please know that our FLLS librarians will be available and able to help you until I return. On April 8, during the eclipse, our librarians will be out of the office visiting libraries in the path of totality and joining in library programs that day.

<u>Demystifying Misinformation</u> (CLRC)

Wednesday, April 10th | 10:00am - 11:30am | FREE

Misinformation has been around since ancient Egyptian times. It's not new, but evolving technology has increased its spread exponentially. This webinar will introduce participants to basic book repair for circulating or general collections. Attendees will learn how to repair common types of damage, such as hinge repair, tipping in loose pages, page mending and spine repair. During the webinar, participants will be able to watch narrated action videos of the repairs with live step by step instructions. At the conclusion of this workshop, participants will: be familiar with different aspects of book repair for circulating collections and be familiar with book repair tools, supplies, and equipment. Special Procedures for Audio/Visual Materials

VOLUME NUMBERS

The following examples will help to define and clarify the standardizations that should be used when entering information in the **Volume** field of a multi-part set. A multi-part set is defined as any item that includes multiple parts and is packaged as such. The number of discs in each case determines what information goes in the volume field.

For example:

```

If these four discs are packaged all together in one case the volume field should contain the following information:

d. 1-4

Note: there is a space between the period and the first number. If the space is left out or additional spaces are added it won't match during the holds processing.

If these four discs are packaged in two cases the volume fields should contain the following information:

d. 1-2

d. 3-4

If these four discs are packaged separately in individual cases the volume fields should contain the following information:

d. 1

d. 2

d. 3

d. 4

Please follow the above standardized format for all multi-set items. Please do not enter disc information into the volume field for BOCDs unless the set has been split (ex. books by Diana Gabaldon). If you receive any item that doesn't fit this standard, please contact Deb: dgeier@fils.org.

FREE TEXT BLOCK

Whenever you are entering an item with multiple discs (regardless of format) you must enter, "Check for X discs," in the **Free Text Block** field. This includes DVDs, Blu-Rays, audiobooks, and music CDs. You can also use this field to list the pieces included in a kit, game, or special item.

SCRLC routinely supports creative proposals to improve regional access and resource sharing through technology. Digitization projects allow materials to be accessed regionally through New York Heritage, New York State Historic
Newspapers, <a href="the the through through

- partnerships increasing representation of and with communities that have been historically and systematically oppressed;
- geographically underrepresented communities in the SCRLC region;
- innovative approaches to availing digitized collections, e.g., walking tours, virtual tours (e.g. participation in the 360-degree Empire State Immersive Experience project), and HistoryForge participation.

The Lisa Libraries Book Donation Program

The Lisa Libraries donates new children's books and helps establish small libraries for organizations that work with kids in low-income or underserved areas. Founded in 1990, the Lisa Libraries was started by author Ann M. Martin and friends to honor and memorialize children's book editor Lisa Novak. Some of the libraries established have been at day-care centers, prison visiting areas for children of incarcerated parents, homeless shelters, battered women's shelters, and after-school programs. The Lisa Libraries supplements under-filled shelves as well as provides books to many children who may never have owned a book before. Since its founding, the Lisa Libraries has contributed over 500,000 books to nonprofit organizations across the country.
